

ANNUAL MEETING - January 29, 2017 - Minutes

The meeting was called to order by Father Ken Brannon at 10:45 a.m. in the Sanctuary of the church. Judi Fuller was appointed Clerk for the Annual Meeting.

No additions to the agenda were offered from the congregation present.

Ann Scales moved and JoEllen Collins seconded that the minutes from the 2016 Annual Meeting be approved as written. The motion passed.

Father Ken thanked all for coming and referred them to the written annual report for detailed reports from most ministries and officers of the church.

He invited Heather Black, outgoing Senior Warden, to make some informal comments. She welcomed the new vestry members and expressed what a growing experience their coming years on the vestry will be. She urged everyone to participate in the upcoming Strategic Thinking process that will soon be underway. She thanked everyone who stepped in to fill the gap during her absence during the past few months.

Fr. Ken

- added his thanks to the outgoing members of the vestry, Doug Cleven, Page Klune, David Harrison, and Wally Morgus. They each offered unique gifts and he was grateful for their service. Officers of the vestry (Treasurer, Clerk, and Junior Warden) will be elected at the first new vestry meeting. Jon Thorson has been appointed and has accepted to be the Senior Warden for the coming year. Jon brings a steady hand for the church and an eye on the general community to the position;
- gave his thanks to the people who have agreed to stand for positions on the vestry and as delegates and alternates to the Diocesan Convention this year. Although nominations can be made from the floor, he is grateful they said "Yes" when they were asked;
- staff members were recognized as dedicated and hardworking. He also mentioned the assistance given by our outside bookkeeper and maintenance crew.
- noted that it is a healthy system that allows for change of leadership and he thanked ministry chairs for their past and ongoing work. Some committees have not yet identified their leadership for the coming year, and Fr. Ken urged parishioners to consider participating in church life this way. The following is a list of such changes:

Persecuted Christians: Anne Zauner and Marshall Peterson to discern the future of this group Pastoral Care: will be augmented with the new Stephen Ministry commitment under the steady guidance of Father Ken, Maryanne Whitcomb, Helen Morgus and Marcia Liebich.

 gave thanks to the church for their support of the Brannon family the past 10 years during many challenges and changes.





David Caldwell, as Junior Warden, reported on the building and grounds projects during an eventful 2016. The major items accomplished are listed in the annual report, but highlighted the parking lot LED lights and the new roof at the rectory. A short list of projects for 2017 has been identified in that written report.

Wally Morgus, as chair of the Nominating Committee, thanked his fellow committee members, Heather Black, Page Klune, Patty Sloan, and Jon Thorson. They began work in October to receive, review, and prepare nominations for three vestry seats, six delegates to convention, and 5 alternates to convention.

Nominees for vestry (Rae DeVito, Ruth Jones, Becky Smith) were elected by acclamation. Nominees for Diocesan Convention delegates (Carter Hedberg, Tom Archie, Tim Price, Page Klune, Sara Gorby, Helen Morgus) were elected by acclamation

Nominees for Diocesan Convention alternate delegates (Beverly Boas, Don Liebich, Marcia Liebich, Patty Sloan, Wally Morgus) were elected by acclamation.

Brett Moellenberg, Managing Director of the St. Thomas Playhouse, congratulated the Playhouse Charter Committee for entering the 15th year of Playhouse activity. In 2016 Playhouse doubled audience numbers from 2015, added a new two-week day camp, and provided over \$10,000 in tuition scholarships through the H. Edward Bilkey Memorial Fund. Playhouse is unique in that it provides live musical performances to nearly every school in Blaine and Camas Counties, provides the largest inter-generational musical theater opportunity, and they have the largest theater arts camp by far. 2017 budget reflects the actual income and expense categories from 2016.

Paul Ahern, as Chair of the Stewardship Committee, added a few comments to supplement his written report. He expressed what a joy it was to work on the committee along with Maryanne Whitcomb, John Ashton, Patience Ziebarth, Nancy Cord, Page Klune, Sara Pettit, and Vickrie Cutler. The theme of "Living Generously" was especially heartwarming and will be even more important going into the future.

Doug Cleven, Treasurer of the Vestry

- thanked all who continue to give so graciously which is what drives the economy of the parish.
- Reviewed of 2016 Actuals
- Presentation of the 2017 Budget As the 2017 Proposed Budget has been moved and seconded by the vestry, discussion was held. Wally Morgus pointed out the contribution made by STP is significant and that the staff/clergy will receive a 2% raise. Fr. Ken also explained the history of the Anonymous Grant and how the vestry chooses to use it. He also invited others to consider gifts like that in the future. Heather Black pointed out how many people review and assist in the production and execution of the budget. The vote was held and the motion passed to approve the 2017 budget.

Father Ken Brannon awarded a Rector's Cross to Judith Smooke for her passion about the arts and dedication to St. Thomas. She has served on the vestry, is a Eucharistic Minister, helped start the Book Club, provided leadership on the Arts Committee and the Community Labyrinth. She is an integral part of St. Thomas, attends worship regularly, a person of prayer, and has personally supported the rector and his family.

There being no further business, Fr. Ken asked Joel Bejot to lead those gathered in the Doxology.

Art Dahl moved and Heather Black seconded that the meeting be adjourned. The motion passed by acclamation and the meeting was adjourned at 11:35 a.m.

2017 IN REVIEW



Rector's Report by the Rev. Kenneth H. Brannon



St. Thomas Church experienced growth in 2017. Normally when we talk about growth, we think of membership and financial giving; it is true that we have grown in both of those areas. But there are other kinds of growth that are also important, and I want to highlight some of these areas as well. You will find more details in the following reports.

• Membership - We had a net gain of 21 members in 2017. This includes those who filled out a Member Information Form for the first time, minus those who died or transferred their membership to another church. Judi Fuller has done a great job of tracking this information and Mike Menser and his team of ushers have played an important role in welcoming new folks to our worship services.

• Financial Giving - Our pledges and grants to the operating fund remain strong and are growing slightly each year. In addition, in 2017, we received about \$350,000 in new gifts to our long term funds (endowment and capital improvement). If you have not done so already,

please consider making a major gift to St. Thomas Church or including the church in your will. This ensures that the church will be a source of spiritual strength for generations to come.

- Strategic Planning The parish did excellent work in 2017 clarifying core values and creating measurable goals for each of these values. Implementation teams are now working to make these goals a reality, with an annual review planned in late spring. Thank you to everyone for assisting with this process, clarifying our core identity, and improving our outreach into the community.
- Ministries and Programs Our ministries and programs have grown. For example:
 - The music program added new offerings and strengthened existing offerings. In addition to our beloved parish choir, St. Thomas now enjoys choral evensong, a bell choir, an RSCM choir for children, a recital series in the fall, more singers at Taize, and new musical styles during Sacred Space on Sunday evenings.
 - Pastoral Care is growing. We enrolled in Stephen Ministries, sent four parish leaders to Anaheim to train as Stephen Leaders, and are now training four additional parish members to serve as Stephen Ministers. The Eucharistic Visitor program has grown, allowing more members of our parish to receive Communion when they can't come to church due to illness or disability. And the pastoral care team continues to offer an outstanding ministry of care and compassion.
 - A new ministry formed ("Act As Christ Taught AACT"), focusing on the needs of persecuted Christians around the world, particularly in the Middle East. This group raised awareness at St. Thomas Church, successfully passed a resolution at Diocesan Convention, and prays regularly for our brothers and sisters in need. A pilgrimage to Israel is being considered for Fall 2018.
 - St. Thomas Playhouse is receiving accolades throughout the community for its creative, generous, high-quality camps and performances.
 - We are actively involved in the larger community, serving as one of the hosts for Ketchum Community Dinner; supporting Hospice and Palliative Care of the Wood River Valley, the Hunger Coalition and the Interfaith Relief Fund; training parish and community leaders in how to recognize and prevent sexual abuse (Safeguarding God's Children); becoming a Red Cross Shelter in the event of disaster; joining the "Stigma-Free Campaign" with the National Alliance on Mental Illness (NAMI); and providing leadership at the diocesan level. We understand that we don't exist merely for ourselves, but also for the health and wholeness of the larger community.
- Faithful Departed Finally, we lost several members of St. Thomas Church this year (as well as other beloved community members) : Gary Black, Sally Donart, Paige Mercer, David Meyers, Diane Shumway, and Judith Smooke. In the burial service, we often pray that the departed will go from "strength to strength" in the life of God's kingdom. In this way, we recognize that the process of growth never ends.





Senior Warden Report by Jon Thorson

2017 was a fine St. Thomas year. As reflected in a portion of our mission statement we were certainly "a village church that is a hospitable haven providing comfort, peace, succor, and spiritual inspiration to all."

Prominent among many activities was the vigorous completion of our Strategic Visioning exercise that will direct our future activities. Led by Fr. Ken, the steering committee, Vestry, and congregation, core values were identified accompanied by goals and strategies to assure their achievement. Implementation of the goals is already underway. (See pages 16-17 for more details.)

Fr. Ken continued to provide food for our spiritual growth through thoughtfully crafted messages that bring the teaching of Christ into our contemporary lives. The Vestry under-

pinned leadership by attending to the well-being of our physical assets, as well as supporting the needs of the administration and the congregation.

Our fearless administrator has kept all operations on time with diligence and gentle prodding, sometimes necessary for some such as myself. Joel, Sara, and Brett have enthusiastically executed their programs. Our ministries continue to remain in dedicated service hands.

Finally, it has been an honor to serve as Senior Warden this year. And remember to carry kindness with you everywhere like a shadow or a friend.

Junior Warden Report by David Caldwell

2017 was not as busy a year for your Junior Warden as 2016, but we did complete several projects at the church and the rectory:

<u>Rectory Water Leak</u>: In June a water hose from the water source to the washing machine broke and leaked all over the laundry room floor, located on the 2nd floor inside the master bedroom. Water also leaked down the wall into the stairwell and entry. The result was a fairly major amount of damage that required restoration service from Valley Maintenance, who acted quickly to remove damaged subfloor, carpet, baseboard and drywall. Once the damaged areas were dry, the process of putting it all back together was slow with delays by the insurance adjuster from Church Insurance located in Salt Lake City. Eventually Valley Maintenance was successful in convincing the adjuster to agree to replace the carpet in the master bedroom and the stairs to the master.

<u>Other Rectory Repairs</u>: The north and south decks at the Rectory were in deteriorated condition and our "go to" handyman, John Osenga did an excellent job repairing and preserving the decks to avoid future costly replacement. While I was spending time this summer at the Rectory I noticed how very worn the main living area carpet had become. I recommended to the Vestry the carpet be replaced in consultation with Fr. Ken and the Brannon family. After discussion the Brannon family decided they preferred a wood/engineered wood floor, and they presented several samples. The result was we installed an engineered wood floor at a lower cost than comparable grade carpet and new pad, and the Brannons are pleased with the result.

<u>Cross Lighting</u>: The cross lights became an issue with a couple of members of the community in the vicinity of the Church at night. The result was the lights were set at a lower light and a timer was installed to turn the lights off after 11:00 p.m. in compliance with the new Dark Skies policy of Ketchum. I believe some adjustment still needs to be made to the timer because this winter I have noticed the lights are not on at 7:30 a.m. and the policy allows lights on at 7:00 a.m.

<u>Tree Maintenance</u>: With the vestry's authorization we had Arborcare perform an annual inspection of all trees on the property and complete appropriate pruning in May. During the summer we performed the one time special treatment

of the ash trees in the lower courtyard and we discovered the trees were completely root bound and all of them would have had a short remaining life if we had not performed this service. A month after the service was completed on inspection I noticed vigorous new growth buds on all the trees.

<u>Entry Way Carpet</u>: The carpet at both the upper and lower level main entrances was very worn and we replaced it in July 2017 with a little darker durable entry type carpet that appears to be wearing well.

<u>Front Sign</u>: The church sign on Sun Valley Road was in disrepair and needed a new roof and paint. Our handyman, John Osenga, completed the new roof and the repainting of both sides of the sign in early May, and it presents a bright welcome to St Thomas. We also reinstalled the hooks for special services like Evensong and reinstalled the WRJC sign on the inside of the sign post.

<u>Choir Loft Lights:</u> We replaced the light bulbs in the choir loft in March, but continued to have problems with burned out bulbs. After investigation by Joe Flora, Electrician, we discovered a circuit problem and had a breaker replaced and also installed a new dimer.

2017 Projects to Consider:

<u>Big Screen in Narthex</u>: There has been discussion about installing a large audio/visual screen in the narthex and a camera in the nave so that the overflow of people during holiday services and funerals who must be in the narthex can clearly see the altar.

<u>Labyrinth Repair</u>: As some of you may have noticed this past summer, the labyrinth needs repairing. This is a community asset sponsored by St Thomas, and a future repair plan will need to involve certain groups within the community at large who have been supportive of this special asset in the past.

I appreciate the opportunity to serve as your Junior Warden for the past 2 years at St Thomas, and it is now time for a new Junior Warden with his or her vision of what St Thomas needs to best serve this growing parish and the community.

Treasurer's Report by Wally Morgus

The overall financial condition of St. Thomas Church is strong. We continue to thrive, borne of three pillars:

- 1) the overwhelming generosity of our congregation and visitors;
- 2) the thoughtful diligence of our volunteers and staff in achieving the goals of our ministries, programs, and administration within the limits of our means; and
- 3) the skillful and caring leadership of our Rector and Vestry.

2017 Financial Performance

Underpinned by the foregoing, the highlights of our 2017 financial performance include:

- Total Income clicked in at \$927,400 102% of budget and topping 2016 results by \$36,800.
- Assessable Income Pledges, Plate Offerings, and Grants totaled \$663,000 98% of budget and surpassing 2016 totals by \$29,000.
- \$27,000 of our Anonymous Grant (\$47,000 per year) down from \$32,000 in 2016 was recognized as Assessable Income to support church operations. The balance of the 2017 Grant amount \$20,000 was deposited to our Endowment Fund.
- Non-Assessable Income Facility Use Fees, Special Offerings, Prior-year Carryover totaled \$28,000 129% of budget.
- St. Thomas Playhouse Income totaled \$236,500 112% of budget and eclipsing 2016 levels by \$22,800.
- Total Expenses checked in at \$926,300 102% of budget and exceeding 2016 totals by \$41,000.
 - ♦ Payroll & Costs came in at \$407,000 98% of budget and less than 2016 levels by \$1,000.
 - Program Expenses supporting our array of ministries totaled \$42,900 122% of budget and surpassing 2016 levels by \$17,800.
 - Church Operating Expenses Utilities, Building & Grounds Services, Bookkeeping, Advertising, etc. totaled \$124,200 100% of budget and less than 2016 levels by \$3,500.
 - Rectory Operating Expenses added up to \$15,300 123% of budget and exceeding 2016 levels by \$3,000. The





lion's share of the budget overage was in Repairs & Maintenance.

- St. Thomas Playhouse (STP) Expenses totaled \$187,300 110% of budget and exceeding 2016 sums by \$3,600.
 Overall net financial contribution (Income minus Expenses) by STP totaled \$49,200 118% of budget and surpassing the 2016 contribution by \$30,000!
- Ministries Outside the Congregation Expenses totaled \$149,700 101% of budget and exceeding 2016 levels by \$20,900.
- The Net Surplus from Operations for St. Thomas Church for 2017 totaled \$1,094 60% of budget.

2018 Operating Budget

The Budget Committee, Jon Thorson, Todd Stewart, Judi Fuller, and Wally Morgus, with important input from staff and volunteers, drafted the 2018 Budget and presented it to the Vestry and Fr. Ken for review, revision, and approval. The highlights of the 2018 Budget include:

- Total Income budgeted for 2018 is \$920,949 \$16,000 greater than budgeted for 2017 and \$7,000 less than actually realized in 2017.
 - Pledge Offerings budgeted for 2018 are \$505,000 \$20,000 greater than budgeted for 2017 and \$40,000 greater than actually realized in 2017. Based on the results from the Annual Stewardship Drive in Fall 2017, the budget is reasonable.
 - In 2018, we anticipate further weaning of Church operations from using the Anonymous Grant (AG). As such, we have budgeted \$20,000 of the AG to support operations. Any unused balance may be designated by the Vestry for deposit to one of our long-term funds, e.g., Capital Improvement Fund, Endowment Fund.
 - St. Thomas Playhouse (STP) Income budgeted for 2018 is \$224,725 \$12,500 greater than budgeted for 2017 and \$12,000 less than actually realized in 2017.
- Total Expenses budgeted for 2018 are \$919,290 \$16,300 greater than budgeted for 2017 and \$7,000 less than actual expenses in 2017.
 - Rector's Expenses budgeted for 2018 are \$144,108 a \$3,200 greater than budgeted for 2017 and \$5,500 greater than actual expenses in 2017.
 - Staff Compensation budgeted for 2018 is \$261,300 \$10,000 less than budgeted for 2017 and \$2,000 less than actual in 2017.
 - The 2018 budget does not include a Children & Family Director. For 2018, the role of the Children & Family Director will be handled by a contractor and is budgeted \$15,000 as a Program Expense.
 - ♦ Staff Compensation Expense reflects a 2% year-over-year increase in wages for staff and an 11.5% increase in health/dental insurance premiums.
 - Program Expenses budgeted for 2018 are \$46,705 \$14,000 greater than budgeted for 2017 and \$4,000 greater than actual expenses in 2017.
 - In addition to the expense of a contractor as the Children & Family Director (see above), there are new Program Expenses budgeted for 2018 to fund the activities of two emerging programs: our Stephen Ministry (\$1,500) and our Act As Christ Taught (AACT) ministry (\$500).
 - Program Expenses ebb and flow from year to year. The 2018 program budgets, most constructed using a zero-based approach, reflect reasonable expectations.
 - Church Operating Expenses budgeted for 2018 are \$126,000 \$5,000 greater than budgeted for 2017 and about \$2,000 greater than actual expenses in 2017.
 - Rectory Operating Expenses budgeted for 2018 are \$13,700 \$1,300 greater than budgeted for 2017 and about \$1,600 less than actual expenses in 2017. The \$1,300 budgeted increase is 100% manifested on the Repairs & Maintenance line.
 - Expenses for Ministry Outside the Congregation Diocesan Assessment, Millennium Development Goals (MDG) Assessment, Rector's Discretionary Outreach, Special Offerings – budgeted for 2018 total \$147,942, which is about \$1,000 less than budgeted for 2017 and about \$1,700 less than actual expense in 2017.
 - The Diocesan Assessment and MDG Assessment are driven by Assessable Income. In toto, these equal about 21.7% of Assessable Income.
- Net Ordinary Income (Surplus) budgeted for 2018 is \$1,659, which is about \$100 less than budgeted for 2017 and about \$600 more than actually realized in 2017.

Finance Committee - by Roger Gould

The St Thomas Endowment closed the year 2017 with \$501,934 of assets under management by ClearRock Capital. This was up \$64,217 from year end 2016 and reflects a strong stock market and contributions. Performance improved over 2016 with a 12.5% total return which was in line with our custom benchmark of 12.4%. All sectors of the portfolio were positive highlighted by Emerging Markets up 43.4%. Domestic equities were up 20.7% and Fixed Income was up 4.9%.

During 2017 the Finance Committee worked with our investment manager to improve the portfolio. Asset Allocation was moved from a 50% Equity /50% Fixed Income to a 60%/40% mix. The Vestry approved a spending policy based on the Finance Committee's recommendation of a 3% draw calculated on a three year moving average at year end. We also worked to improve exposure to Small Cap and Mid Cap equities that will be effective in 2018.

The Finance Committee also reviews the Operating Reserve which closed the year at \$396,128. It is invested in high quality fixed income vehicles with a very short term maturity. 50% of the Reserve has a maturity of less than .3 years. Performance was 1.6% for the year mostly from income.

¹The Spending Policy for St. Thomas Endowment Fund authorizes an annual distribution of monies from the Fund equal three percent (3.0%) of the most-recent three-year moving average of the market value of the Fund as calculated as of December 31 each year. Monies so determined (the "Annual Distribution") may be transferred, in whole or in part, to the Operating Account(s) of St. Thomas Church for any purpose as approved by the Vestry. From time-to-time, the Vestry may determine that any or all of the Annual Distribution is not required for operating purposes and, therefore, is not to be transferred to the Operating Account(s) (the "Non-Transferred Annual Distribution"). Any such Non-Transferred Annual Distribution shall be reinvested in the Fund.

² The Anonymous Grant (Line 4527) is a gift we receive each summer in the amount of \$40,000-50,000. This annual donation is part of a twenty-year, one million dollar gift begun in 2009. There are no restrictions on the use of this money, although the vestry prefers to place it in long-term funds when possible. 2018 will be the 10th year of this grant.

Annual Giving Campaign by John Ashton, Chair, Stewardship Committee

The theme of the 2018 Stewardship Campaign was "Journey to Generosity". I can report that the trip was quite successful. While we did not set a specific goal for the campaign, we targeted the pledge figure of \$505,000 as an

amount which would assure the financial stability and well-being of St. Thomas Church in 2018. As of early January, we have raised \$494,717 in pledges which is 98% of our target and virtually assures us that we will achieve our full targeted amount once all pledges for 2018 are finally in.

In terms of numbers of donors, 179 families and individuals have contributed so far for 2018. Of this number 89 pledges remained the same as last year, 45 represented an increase, 27 decreased their pledge and we had 18 new donors. Thanks to all of you who responded so generously to our campaign this year.

I would also like to thank the faithful members of this year's Stewardship Committee: Nancy Cord, Ruth Lieder, Candice Pate, Maryanne Whitcomb, Patience Ziebarth and Vickrie Cutler. Vickrie served as the Vestry representative on the committee and also opened up her lovely home for the note-writing party that initiated the campaign. That event and the reception celebrating the successful end of the campaign following the service on November 19 were exquisitely catered by members of our Committee.



Sara Pettit and Gary Pearson also deserve the thanks of our Committee and the congregation for their heartfelt and inspirational messages on stewardship delivered at services in November.

Finally, the Stewardship Committee could not function without the leadership of Father Ken and our efficient and highly competent Administrator, Judi Fuller. The real nuts and bolt work of the Stewardship Committee is done by Judi. She lets the Committee know what needs to be done, keeps the entire process on schedule, prepares all public relations materials and communications on behalf of the Committee and maintains all donor records and receipts. She makes the job of the Committee and its Chair a relative breeze.

Thanks to everyone who contributed to the success of our Journey to Generosity which will provide the financial resources for what will undoubtedly be another great year for St. Thomas Church and its mission!

Strategic Thinking Process by Georgia Stewart

The Strategic Thinking process at St. Thomas is well on its way to accomplishing the goals set forth by the Vestry in May 2017. At that time five core values were identified as critical to what brings life to our parish, and a strategic filter was adopted to use in evaluating future strategic decisions. These decisions can include programming, staffing, space usage, volunteer support, outreach, and building improvements.

The five core values are:

- 1. Worship that calls all into deeper communion with God
- 2. Welcome, inclusion, and ongoing care of one another
- 3. Community engagement and service
- 4. Ministry to equip young people for lives of value, faith, and meaning
- 5. A culture of generosity

We believe that what we are doing is effective planning for the future and thus is important work vital to the long-term health of our parish.

1. Worship: Seek out and gather stories of ways that members have experienced God in worship.

Our goal is to better understand how members of St. Thomas may have experienced God during our worship services. When was it? What was it like? With the thought that speaking one's story aloud to another has special powers to enlighten, heal, strengthen and empower, and teach – both oneself and others - we want to give people the opportunity to have that experience at St. Thomas. We know that spiritual experiences don't just happen at church, of course, but we aim to start first with St. Thomas-based experiences to also learn more about the church's role in the spiritual life of its congregation. We held a parish-wide storytelling group on December 17 and plan to continue in the new year with one-on-one meetings, group meetings, and possibly written or audio accounts. Georgia Stewart presented a general overview of pastoral care at St. Thomas, and then Marylyn Pauley, Helen Morgus, and Bobbie Dahl represented the Pastoral Care Team, Stephen Ministry, and the Eucharistic Visitor Program. They talked about the specific roles and responsibilities of each group and how they interrelate.

Garden & Grounds by Kaye Kearns

After the heavy snowpack and spring rains of 2017, the gardens at the church and the rectory flourished! The plants and shrubs were lush and prolific. It was a joy to behold the color, texture and variety of blooming perennials throughout the season. The arborist completed work on the compacted roots of the ash trees in the lower courtyard by air spacing (removing the soil around and then pruning the roots to give them more space and oxygen). The trees responded very well to the treatment, showing healthy new growth. They also pruned the deciduous trees and removed dead limbs on the spruce trees.

We have agreed with the Green Team to be 'trout friendly' in the garden. We are using organic fertilizers on the lawn, shrubs, and perennials and organic materials in the treatment of weeks and pests.

The rectory garden was reworked by moving and/or replacing some of the struggling or overgrown plants. We also expanded the garden by installing a new bed on the west side of the house with shade tolerant plants.

Several old, encroaching shrubs were removed and replaced in the process. In 2018, the work will continue around the back of the rectory. There are several conifers that need to be removed and replaced with more appropriate shrubs.

Many thanks to our hardworking committee members for the time they devote to keeping the beds looking their best.

We serve as acolytes during regular Sunday services at 8:00 a.m. and 9:30 a.m. We also serve at Evensong, holy day services, funerals, and memorial services.

Pastoral Care Team by Maryanne Whitcomb

During 2017, Father Ken continued to lead the Pastoral Care Team in offering spiritual support for those in need within the congregation. The committee responds when a parishioner asks for help, or when Father Ken is aware of a need.

The Pastoral Care Team serves members of the congregation who are ill, grieving, or facing some distress in their lives. This is accomplished through prayer, phone calls, performing helpful errands, visiting, sending notes of encouragement, assisting with local transportation, or preparing simple meals. Another key role of the Pastoral Care Team is the maintenance of the parish prayer list. One member of the team is responsible to pray the prayer list, in its entirety, on each of the seven days of every week – and – a full review of the list is done quarterly to ensure the list remains accurate and up-to-date.

Members of the parish wishing to add someone to the prayer list may do so at any time in the year ahead by filling out a brief Prayer Request Form that can be obtained from Judi Fuller in the church office.

Stephen Ministry by Maryanne Whitcomb

During the 2015 and 2016 years, several members of the Pastoral Care Team conducted many hours of research into the Stephen Ministries Series, as a potential means of extending and expanding care further within the parish and the community. The Stephen Series is a complete system for training and organizing laypeople to provide one-to-one Christian care. The non-profit corporation operates out of St. Louis and since 1975 has trained more than 12,000 congregations from more than 170 denominations.

On September 26, 2016, the vestry approved an application to the Stephen Ministry program and on October 7, that approval was received. Fr. Ken attended a 5-day Stephen Ministry Leadership training course in Anaheim CA in January 2017, accompanied by Marcia Liebich, Helen Morgus and Maryanne Whitcomb. The four above mentioned SM Leaders met on April 10 to establish mission and vision.

MISSION: To train and supervise lay caregivers to provide Christian care to those hurting, troubled, or in need.

VISION: We serve as Christ to one another by offering quality on-going care to members of St. Thomas Church and others in need in our community.

The summer months were spent in recruitment, interviews, and mutual discernment with potential Stephen Ministers to begin to undertake the fifty hours of required training in the Fall. In late August, the following were named to comprise the first training class: Georgia Stewart, Don Liebich, Sabrina Roblin, and Rebecca Waycott. The actual training began on Monday, November 6, and continued weekly through December 18.

After a two week break for the Christmas Season, training classes began again on January 8, 2018. The 50 hours of coursework will be completed on March 26, 2018. A commissioning ceremony will be held on a Sunday date in April, to be announced at a later time.

The Stephen Ministry Leaders are looking forward to the opportunity to pair each newly commissioned Stephen Minister with his or her first care receiver in the coming months of 2018.



Columbarium by Sally Horn

The committee, comprised of Beverly Boas, Dave Hitchin, Sally Horn, Carol Karner, and Father Ken, administers the maintenance and use of the Columbarium and recommends policy to the vestry. Our committee meets twice a year, in June and October. Members serve a three year term.

The Committee continues to provide publications which assist with end of life planning, which include the Episcopal Foundation publication, *Planning for the End of Life*, which is available for \$5.00 in the church office. We also have available copies of the Idaho End of Life Coalition book, *The Right Choice at the Right Time*, which are available on loan or may be purchased for \$25.00. This book gives details about the Idaho registry for individual health proxy and advance directive decisions. It also provides other advance planning tools.

St. Thomas' Columbarium, created in 2003, is an appropriate alternative to a church cemetery. It is a beautiful consecrated garden setting where an enclave of niches and urns holds the ashes of deceased communicants. In addition to housing 94 niches, the Columbarium includes a Memorial Plaque with space for 56 nameplates. This Plaque is provided for communicants who wish to have their ashes scattered or interred elsewhere.



As of December 31, 2017, the balance in the Columbarium Fund was \$37,547. At present, only 14 standard niches are available for \$1,000 each, 11 nameplates for the Memorial Board are available for \$300 each, and 9 larger niches for personal-sized urns are available and may be reserved for \$2,000. There are no additional expenses or annual maintenance fees. Father Ken Brannon can help families evaluate appropriate Columbarium alternatives and memorial services.

The date for this year's "Hole-in-the-Wall" celebration of life party, for those who currently have purchased niches or nameplates, will be hosted by Beverly Boas on July 19, 2018 at 6:00 p.m.

Please visit the columbarium which currently is being maintained beautifully and seasonally by Beverly Boas. All members of the Committee are available to review the process for reservations or to answer any questions.

Ushers by Mike Menser

2017 was an eventful year for our ushers. We consolidated the role of the greeters and oblation bearers into the usher's duties. Now two people do what six did. We also dramatically increased the number of ushers to 14. We are now preparing a 3-month schedule in advance, so the church office and the ushers know who is ushering any given Sunday.

We began using BLUE VISITOR name tags, so our members can recognize visitors and welcome them and look for them to visit with at coffee hour. We encourage all those attending services to wear their name tags. It promotes recognition and can help stimulate more personal conversations. We welcome any and all suggestions from the congregation concerning our usher's program.

Adult Education Committee by Don Liebich, Chair

The 2017 Adult Education program was highlighted by a five-part series presented by Irwin Sentilles, a part time resident of the Valley. These lectures were designed to provide a greater understanding of biblical texts through examination of their context, literary elements and ability to engage us. The lectures were well attended and covered such topics as how to read and interpret scripture, the four Gospels, the Great Commandment, and the creation stories. We examined the topics from historical, cultural, and theological perspectives and the implications for how we are to live our lives today. We are grateful to Irwin for providing this learning opportunity and hope that we can continue this next summer.

In addition to these lectures the Adult Education program included other discussion topics such as:

- Did Jesus Always Preach Non-Violence?
- Science and Religion
- What Does It Mean to be a Christian?
- "Pilgrim or Tourist" with Rev. Bill Harper

We are grateful to Jima Rice for her leadership and help in expanding our education offerings. We welcome any others who would be interested offering topics and leadership.

The 2018 program will begin with a collaboration with the Sun Valley Center for the Arts in there "Big Idea" project "This Land is Whose Land?" on refugees and immigration. Please look for the information on our website or in the Narthex explaining the events associated with this project.



St. Thomas Book Group by Laurie Ahern



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Taizé by Georgia Stewart



The weekly Taizé services held at St. Thomas during the winter months are now fully established in our yearly calendar. The services in this series began in Advent of 2016, and continued in 2017 until the beginning of Lent in February. These beautiful candlelight services of song, silence, and prayer were conducted on Wednesdays at 5:30 p.m. in the nave. This year we experienced increased interest and participation from the interfaith community in the Valley.

The contemplative prayer form that has become known as "Taizé Prayer" takes its name from the Taizé community of France, founded in the early 1940's by Brother Roger. For more than 60 years, until his death in 2005, Brother Roger worked tirelessly to open ways to heal the divisions between Christians and among people in general. The Taizé community is made up of more than 100 brothers from Catholic, Protestant, and Orthodox backgrounds who come from 25 countries. Every year thousands of young adults from every continent go to Taizé to pray and to prepare themselves to work for peace, reconciliation, and trust.

The St. Thomas service is crafted around the worship style of Taizé. It includes music from the Taizé community as well as other music in the style of Taizé. It incorporates two distinguishing

marks of Taizé-like worship: repetition and silence.

Eucharistic Visitors by Bobbie Dahl

In April 2017, Father Ken trained Bobbie Dahl, Connie Hoffman, and Maryanne Whitcomb to join Georgia Stewart and Pat Jorgensen as Eucharistic Visitors. In conjunction with Father Ken, we bring the Sacrament to those parishioners unable to attend church but would like to receive Communion. This takes place usually, but not always, on a Sunday afternoon.

On December 10, Bobbie was part of an after-church panel, conducted by Georgia Stewart, to present three Pastoral Care ministries: Stephen Ministry, Pastoral Care Team, and Eucharistic Visitors.

Our committee meets every three months to update schedules and procedure.

Flower Guild by Betsy Ashton

The St Thomas Flower Guild is responsible for the 2 altar arrangements every Sunday and decorating the church for Christmas and Easter. Several of our members are not full time in the area. We obtain the flowers from various sources in and around Ketchum or from a Boise wholesale florist that delivers to the church. In the summer months, we try to use flowers from local gardens, not only to save money but it seems more appropriate with all the lovely gardens at our disposal.

The Flower Fund pays for all flowers and materials. It is supported by generous donations. We welcome memorials and dedications for weekly flowers and donors will be mentioned in the Sunday bulletin.

We have talented and dedicated members that work in pairs or alone. There are no requirements for joining the Flower Guild – just a willingness to enhance our Sunday service. Please think about joining us! It's a very small time commitment with a very big payback!





Music Ministry by Joel Bejot

Organist:

In 2017, I played for 69 Eucharist services (including weddings and funerals), and 31 other services or events. I practice regularly, and attempt to balance supporting congregational singing with creative hymn accompaniments, as well as to offer one recital per year, which I gave on October 29.

Music Director:

Over the course of each service, an average of 17 musicians have sung or played with us. This is right at about 10% of the congregation, which is a great place to be. Are you the next musician at St. Thomas?

Choirs:

Parish Choir:

We have done great work this year! In addition to singing hymns and anthems nearly every week, the choir does extra work over the holidays. I am always happy to meet and encourage new singers.

Children's Choir:

We have had a great year so far, having found a group of kids that are very excited to come to choir each week. We use the RSCM "Voice for Life" curriculum. These kids learn so much, and have so much to offer the church and the community.

Taizé:

Evensong Choir:

We offered evensong each month May – December at at 5:30 p.m. Our little choir worked on a lot of great music. 5 different priests and laypeople officiated the service on a rotating basis.

Other Services:

Sacred Space:

In January, we unveiled a new service entitled "Sacred Space." The service was led by a few singers and myself. The service was characterized by Bible readings, poetry, lectio divina group homilies, and less formal music.

In May, we borrowed a set of handbells from St. Michael's Cathedral in Boise. We have purchased other materials to support our use of these bells. We have 8 ringers that meet on a regular basis, and they ring in church about once a month during the school year.

Concert Series:

I produced a short concert series with my own organ recital on October 29, a voice recital with Anna Mejernikova on November 5, and Ellen Sanders on November 12. It was a record year, with 90 people attending the voice recital and 157 at the cello recital! The door offering was also successful.

Thank you all very much for the opportunity to live and work here. It has been a wonderful year, artistically, and I owe so much of that to "St. Thomas and its good people."

- HaRT Sunday: on May 7th, we celebrated a 7th year of partnership between St. Thomas Church and the Haiti Micah Project.
- Sponsorships: In 2017 we had a total of 41 participants in our child sponsorship program, including 9 new sponsors. We raised \$18,556 and sent nearly \$23,000 to HMP at the end of the Summer. HaRT EXTENDS OUR WARMEST AND DEEPEST THANKS TO ALL ST. THOMAS SPONSORS.
- Shoes: Our team worked together to gather and ship 91 pairs of new shoes and 100 pairs of socks.
- Progress: The feeding program in Mirebalais now serves up to 500 children a day. A new kitchen and dining room now allows the safe preparation and serving. The vocational training center is up and running, giving needed skills to the up and coming adults who have aged out of the school. Many of the original children we began sponsoring in 2010 are now adults!

Fortunately, Sunday School is alive and well, thanks to a devoted group of Sunday School teachers, Rachel Brannon, the Interim Sunday School Coordinator, and Sara Gorby, who has expanded her role to oversee the program.

Sunday School Highlights for 2017 include:

- The Epiphany Service on January 6, a special time for children and families.
- Up Front Sundays, in which children and youth sit in the pews for the service, are enjoyed by all every few months.
- Easter Sunday: once again, this was a blockbuster celebration for children at St. Thomas, complete with flowering of the cross, The Egg Godly Play story told by Art Dahl, and meaningful egg craft. Each child received a special Easter bag filled with treats.
- Rite of Passage Sunday in May marked the graduation of children moving from one class to the next.
- The Grand Days of Summer continued to draw children together with adults of the parish during Sunday School (June August) for single-topic lessons including hospitality, hiking, and flowers.
- A special thank you to all our Grands: Helen Morgus, Bev Boas, Mary Malkmus, Art Dahl, Pat Jorgensen, JoEllen Collins, Marilyn Alcamo, Ann Zauner, Jeanne Cassell, Nancy Cord, Travis Reed, and Christie Thompson.
- Registration Carnival and Blessing of the Backpacks , also known as "Hot Dog Sunday," was again a joyful day that included a blessing ceremony, carnival activities, and the hot-dog cart.
- Sunday School Opening: we have continued to meet in the Parish Hall from 9:15 9:30 for an opening time of prayer and singing before going to our classrooms.
- Sunday School classes: there are currently classes for three age groups: 3yrs 1st grade (Godly Play), 2nd-3rd grade (Brick by Brick), and 4th-5th grade (Weaving God's Promises). Teachers facilitate an activity or craft based on the story of the day. Ashely Musbach has done a wonderful job of providing special crafts for the children each Sunday (thank you, Ashley!). Nursery care for children under three years old is also available during the 9:30 a.m. service.

As it has for years, Sunday School attendance fluctuates widely, with weekly numbers ranging from 2 - 15, not including the wide participation at Christmas and Easter. This requires great flexibility in planning. We have been scheduling regular "combined classes" throughout the year on holiday weekends or other historically low Sundays. We will continue to look at the program design in order to best accommodate the ebbs and flows of attendance while providing strong, age-appropriate Christian education.

In 2018, we hope to fill the Sunday School leadership position. In addition, we are thrilled to be expanding the Godly Play curriculum by introducing 30 new Godly Play stories that will be appropriate for children of all ages. There will be a "story drive" inviting parishioners to help fund the effort.

Diocesan Convention by Tim Price

The 50th Convention of the Episcopal Diocese of Idaho was held over the weekend of October 27th at the beautiful and impressive JUMP center in Boise. The deputation representing St. Thomas included Father Ken (Rector), Jon Thorson (Senior Warden). Don Liebich (standing in for David Caldwell, Junior Warden), Beverly Boas, Sara Gorby, Carter Hedberg, Tim Price, Page Klune, and Marcia Liebich. Marshall Peterson, Wayne Schmidt, and Anne Zauner went as guests, as all are invited to do, any year.

As for general business, the delegates passed the 2018 budget and elected Diocesan Council representatives, including Susan Speir of St. Luke's Idaho Falls as Clergy-at-Large, Chris S.C. Clegg of Trinity Pocatello as Lay At-Large Delegate, and, our very own, John Aston, as a Lay Member of Standing Committee. Anne Zauner and Marshall Peterson thoughtfully presented their resolution titled, "Partnering with the Episcopal Diocese of Jerusalem to Support the Persecuted Church in the Middle East", and after a robust discussion, the resolution passed with a resounding, "Yea." Father Ken was reappointed as Chair of the Commission on Ministry and delivered a report as Chair of the Idaho Deputation to General Convention.

The highlight of the Convention was, quite certainly, the attendance of our Presiding Bishop, The Very Rev. Michael Curry. After kicking-off the Convention with an inspired opening sermon at Friday's Evensong in St. Michael's Cathedral, Bishop Curry and his team spent the weekend helping us to intimately come to know the theme of this year's Convention and his vision for the Episcopal Church: the "Jesus Movement." With his energy and enthusiasm (as well as a little help from the Holy Spirit) we were all inspired to "GO!" and to share this vision and movement as loving members of its Episcopal Arm. The Bishop's Canon, Michael Hunn, shared his thoughts on this movement using the metaphor of a jazz band's rhythm section, showing that any of us can lead it and inspire others to follow. We also learned about the unique history of the Episcopal Church, and were gifted a glimpse into the amazing work at Paradise Point, and how they are poised for an even more inspired future.

The Convention adjourned on Sunday, Oct. 29th, following the Convention Eucharist, presided by Presiding Bishop Michael Curry. Delegates, guests, and community members alike filled the convention hall, and all left with a full heart knowing that through Bishop Curry's work, as well as all of those that make up our collective body and soul, the Episcopal Church is alive and well in each and every one of us.

The 2018 convention will be held, once again, in Boise on November 9-11th.


