

YEAR IN REVIEW



St. Thomas Episcopal Church Sun Valley, Idaho

> Annual Meeting January 28, 2018 10:45 a.m.

The meeting was called to order by Father Ken Brannon at 10:45 a.m. in the sanctuary of the church.

Judi Fuller was appointed Clerk for the Annual Meeting.

Jon Thorson, as Senior Warden, was present and will be added to the agenda. No other additions to the agenda were offered from the congregation present.

Rebecca Waycott moved and Laurie Ahern seconded that the minutes from the 2017 Annual Meeting be approved as written. The motion passed.

Father Ken thanked all for coming and referred them to his written report for detailed reports from most ministries and officers of the church. He did, however, highlight the following:

- Growth in the church, in people, finance, self-understanding, and outreach; self-understanding being enhanced by the work of the Strategic Thinking process which led to clarification of our five core values, six goals for 2018, and the many strategies to reach those goals.
- ♦ Ministry growth:
 - many additions to the music program,
 - thanks to all the support ministries, the beauty of our worship services,
 - Playhouse serving as a major outreach to all ages,
 - Youth confirmation class culminating in a visit by the Bishop,
 - quality teachers in the Children's program,
 - Pastoral Care being broadened and deepened through the Stephen Ministry program, the Eucharistic Visitors, the Shawl Ministry, the Community Urgent Needs Fund, in addition to the Pastoral Care Team,
 - community outreach to many local organizations who utilize our building,
 - and the leadership offered by the many ministry leaders, vestry, and wardens.
- Jon Thorson was appointed for a second year as Senior Warden.
- David Caldwell, Margie Gould, and Alyson Witmer stepping down from the vestry with many thanks for their service.

Jon Thorson accepted his appointment with pleasure and expressed what a privilege it was for him to serve this past year. His written report is in the Annual Report, but he extended an open invitation to all parishioners for calls and conversations about church matters. He referred to the lines in a frequently used blessing, "be swift to love, and make haste to be kind," which he sees in what the church is doing.

David Caldwell, Junior Warden for the past two years, reviewed the improvements and repairs at both the church and rectory during that time. He offered suggestions that in the coming year we might focus on repair of the Community Labyrinth and discuss improvements to the overflow situation in the narthex.

Ann Scales, Chair of the Nominating Committee (David Caldwell, Margie Gould, Alyson Witmer, Wally Morgus, Art Dahl) presented and moved the slate of nominations as follows:

- Vestry: Lisa Leach, Brad Musbach, Tim Price. The motion was seconded by Mike Leach. There being no other nominations from the floor, the motion passed by acclamation.
- Convention Delegates: Judi Fuller, Isaac Brannon, Ashley Musbach, Helen Morgus, Wally Morgus, Art Dahl. The motion was seconded by Jima Rice. There being no other nominations from the floor, the motion passed by acclamation.
- Convention Alternate Delegates: Bobbie Dahl, Sheila Witmer, Carter Hedberg, Tom Archie.
 The motion was seconded by Page Klune. There being no other nominations from the floor, the motion passed by acclamation.

Brett Moellenberg, Managing Director of Playhouse,

- reviewed the past year, the 15th season of Playhouse;
- * reported that, financially, it was the most successful season to date and the contribution made back to the Operating Fund of the church was significant;
- * noted that a great deal of work was done to update and revise the Charter for the Playhouse Committee, thanks to the efforts of Rebecca Waycott, a founding member of the Charter Committee, who will be stepping down in accordance with the terms of the Charter.

Wally Morgus, Treasurer,

- * reported that the parish is thriving due to 1) the generosity of the congregants, 2) the volunteers and staff, and 3) the leadership of the vestry and rector;
- * he congratulated Playhouse for their efforts and noted that St. Thomas is receiving "a big bang for their buck" in the community for the approximately \$14,000 that it costs the church to support and underwrite this outreach program;
- * referred people to review the actual numbers for 2017 and the proposed budget for 2018 in the Annual Report.
- * Wally moved and Art Dahl seconded that the proposed Operating Budget for 2018 be adopted. The motion passed.
- * thanked Roger Gould and the Finance Committee for improving the return on our invested funds, meeting the benchmark for the period of 12.5%.
- * The vestry having moved, with Margie Gould seconding, that the Playhouse proposed budget for 2018 be adopted. The motion passed.

The Rector's Cross was presented to Norah Bretall for her remarkable service to the church, serving as a devoted Paper Angel, on the Garden Committee, chair and member of the Columbarium Committee, and loyal parishioner for many years.

There being no further business, Fr. Ken asked Joel Bejot to lead all gathered in the Doxology.

Art Dahl moved and Jima Rice seconded that the meeting be adjourned. The motion passed by acclamation and the meeting was adjourned at 11:40 a.m.

Rector's Report by the Rev. Kenneth H. Brannon



Every year, in preparation for the Annual Report, I review the last four editions of our news-letter, "The Lift." I am always stunned by the vibrancy of St. Thomas Church, the joy we find in being together, and the diversity of our parish offerings. Over and over I hear seasonal members say, "I may only be here a short time each year, but this is my home church; this is where my heart is." Thank you for the ways that you make St. Thomas Church a living and loving expression of God's presence on earth.

In the pages that follow, you will find detailed information about the mission and ministry of St. Thomas. You will learn about worship and the ways that we are nourishing our hearts and souls (core value one). You will appreciate our commitment to welcome all God's children and care for one another in good times and bad (core value two). You will be amazed at ways that we are reaching out in love into the community (core value three). You will rejoice in the

power and presence of children and youth in our midst (core value four). And you will be encouraged by the generosity shown by our members, not only in terms of annual giving, but also in terms of care for the earth, volunteerism, and open-heartedness (core value five).

Of particular note this year:

- We welcomed Liz Hickey as our new Children's Ministry Coordinator and expanded our Godly Play offerings and children's choirs;
- Wayne Hedberg Schmidt and Kathleen Bean were ordained to the transitional diaconate in the fall and are now preparing for ordination to the priesthood, probably in the spring;
- ◆ The Rev. M. Jonah Kendall served as visiting priest in July while I led the Idaho deputation to General Convention in Austin;
- We looked in depth at "The Way of Love" (Turn, Learn, Pray, Worship, Bless, Go, Rest);
- Stephen Ministries graduated its first class of six Stephen Ministers and began training four more, expanding and deepening our pastoral care offerings;
- St. Thomas Church and the Wood River Jewish Community wrote a spiritual psalm together with the help of Rabbi Cantor Robbi Sherwin;
- The Community Labyrinth was repaired and sealed and the Columbarium was expanded;
- ◆ The Annual Giving Campaign was a real success.

It is also worth noting that after almost twelve years as your Rector, I have been named as a finalist for Bishop of Maine, with the election taking place in February. If I am elected, I will leave in the spring and a clergy transition process will begin. If I am not elected, I will continue to serve joyfully and whole-heartedly as your priest until a new call emerges. Thank you for your prayers and support. As I said in a sermon recently, I believe we are continually in the process of being "born again," so that our lives increasingly reflect the goodness and grace of God. I love being transformed by and with you.



Finally, not to worry, incoming Sr. Warden Georgia Stewart would provide oversight during the clergy transition process; she is seasoned and will effectively lead us forward!


I have enjoyed serving and learning as Senior Warden. Many thanks for your support.



This has been a great first year as Junior Warden. It has been an honor to serve with so many great people, learn more about St. Thomas, develop new relationships, and continue my spiritual journey. We are lucky to have such a great administrative staff working hard to make St. Thomas a special place for our congregation and our community. Judi Fuller has been especially helpful and knowledgeable. She is a vital part of St. Thomas functioning so smoothly from day to day. Some highlights for 2018:

Columbarium: Judi ordered and arranged the installation of 64 new niches. We now have 68 regular niches, 9 large niches, and 11 nameplates available and you are invited to secure your spot in the "Hole in the Wall Gang."

Labyrinth: The committee arranged for the repair and annual maintenance of the Labyrinth. The Labyrinth is open to the entire community for use as individuals or groups.



Maintenance Calendar: A calendar is being created for recurring needs of the infrastructure of the Church, Grounds, and Rectory.

Ventilation Housing: The external sheet metal venting needed replacing. This was successfully completed.

Entry Way Carpet: The carpet at both the upper and lower level main entrances was very worn and we replaced it in July 2017 with a little darker durable entry type carpet that appears to be wearing well.

Possibilities for 2019:

Boilers: This could be the year for replacement of the boilers. Funds have been set aside.

Fence: The fence on the east side of the property is in disrepair. We will work with the adjacent property owner for removal and/or replacement.

Fire & Security: A committee has been formed to investigate if and how St. Thomas can better be prepared for fire and/or an act of violence.







Treasurer's Report by Wally Morgus

The overall financial condition of St. Thomas Church remains strong. We continue to thrive, borne of three pillars:

- 1) the overwhelming generosity of our congregation and visitors;
- 2) the thoughtful diligence of our volunteers and staff in achieving the goals of our ministries, programs, and administration within the limits of our means; and
- 3) the skillful and caring leadership of our Rector and Vestry.

2018 Financial Performance

Underpinned by the foregoing, the highlights of our 2018 financial performance include:

- 1. Total Income clicked in at \$717,200 103% of budget and topping 2017 results by \$26,300 (+4% year-over-year).
 - Assessable Income Pledges, Plate Offerings, and Grant(s) totaled \$699,000 103% of budget and surpassing 2017 totals by \$36,300 (+5.5%).
 \$20,000 of our Anonymous Grant (~\$44,000 per year) was recognized as Assessable Income to support church operations; this is down from \$27,000 recognized as Assessable Income in 2017. The balance of the 2018 Grant amount was deposited to our Unrestricted Endowment Fund and, as a result, not recognized as Assessable Income in 2018.
 - Non-Assessable Income Facility Use Fees, Special Offerings, Prior-year Carryover totaled \$18,200 –
 95% of budget.
- 2. Total Expenses checked in at \$674,700 98% of budget and exceeding 2017 totals by \$12,100.
 - Rector Expenses = \$150,400 98% of budget; \$11,800 greater than 2017, with the lion's share of the year-over-year increase attributable to the increase in Pension Premium expense (+\$7,100 year-over-year).
 - Payroll & Costs came in at \$192,500 91% of budget and less than 2017 levels by \$7,000.
 - Program Expenses supporting our array of ministries totaled \$35,500 76% of budget and less than 2017 levels by \$7,400.
 - Church Operating Expenses Utilities, Building & Grounds Services, Bookkeeping, Advertising, etc. totaled \$131,000 – 104% of budget and up over 2017 levels by \$6,800.
 - Rectory Operating Expenses added up to \$12,600 92% of budget and less than 2017 levels by \$2,700.
 We enjoyed a nice savings versus budget in 2018 in Snow Removal and Repairs & Maintenance expenses.
 - Ministries Outside the Congregation Expenses Diocesan Assessment, Millennium Development Goals Assessment, Special Offerings – totaled \$152,700 – 103% of budget and exceeding 2017 levels by \$5,000. The Diocesan Assessment was \$150,600...~21.5% of Assessable Income.
- 3. St. Thomas Playhouse (STP):
 - Income totaled \$204,900 91% of budget and short of 2017 levels by \$31,600 (-13%).
 - Expenses totaled \$249,000 109% of budget and less than 2017 sums by \$16,300.
 - The Net Deficit of \$44,100 was accounted for as part of our Ministries Outside the Congregation Expenses (see above); the STP Net Deficit in 2018 was ~\$3,500 greater than the STP Net Deficit in 2017.
- 4. The Net Surplus from Operations, including St. Thomas Church and Playhouse, totaled \$1,150 about \$55 higher than 2017.





Investment Committee by Roger Gould

The year 2018 for the stock market could be best classified as brutal. The markets experienced their biggest annual loss in over ten years. The Dow Jones Industrial Average declined 5.6%, the S&P 500 was down 6.2%, and the Russell 2000 (a measure of small company stocks) was down 12%. All averages declined significantly from their highs in 2018 during the fourth quarter with the Russell 2000 down 22% from its high in August. Most analysts consider it a bear market at this level.

The St Thomas Endowment was not immune from this market volatility. Total Endowment assets ended the year at \$452,074, a decline of \$36,214 from January 1, 2018. Total return performance was -8.5% for the quarter and -7.3% for the year.

The impact on total return was due primarily to our exposure to Energy, Small cap positions, and the Fixed Income portfolio (due to rising interest rates). Energy was down -20%, Small cap down-12%, and the Fixed Income portfolio down -2%. Not a lot of places to hide in the fourth guarter 2018 as the decline was broad based.

Asset Allocation is within our Investment Policy and is broadly diversified by style and sector. The Endowment has a conservative policy of 60% Equities and 40% Fixed Income. International Equity exposure amounts to 23% of our equities. The portfolio is managed by Clear Rock Capital with policy direction from the Investment Committee.

The Operating Reserve and Unrestricted Endowment accounts ended the year at \$486,738 and are invested in very short fixed income products with a maturity of less than one year. Total return was 1.05% for the year.

Annual Giving Campaign

The theme of this year's Stewardship Campaign was "Transforming Generosity". Most of our members participated and hence will experience the transformative joy that comes from donating to a wonderful cause that does so much good in our lives and in our community. Your generosity also transforms our Church because it enables St. Thomas to continue and expand its mission. Thank you for transforming St. Thomas and being transformed!

As of the date of this report we have raised \$516,278 in pledges which assures that we will be able to comfortably continue all our activities in 2019. In terms of donors, 183 families and individuals have made pledges for 2019 which compares very favorably with the 179 families and individuals which pledged last year. Of the 185 who contributed 84 remained the same as last year, 49 increased their pledge and 27 decreased their pledge. We had 24 new donors.

Our Committee this year consisted of Laurie Ahern, Lynn Campion, Christine Kraatz, Josh Pate, Thomas Benson, Patience Ziebarth, Vickrie Cutler (Vestry representative) and me, with Judi Fuller's providing her customary invaluable administrative assistance and our Rector providing his vision, leadership and encouragement. This proved to be a very successful team and I am sure the Congregation is most appreciative of their efforts. Special thanks to Laurie and Josh for their wonderful remarks on stewardship at services during the Campaign.

transforming generosity

This year was my second (and for the foreseeable future, last) term as Chair of the Committee. The job has been rewarding and, truth be told, actually pretty easy. There are several reasons for this. Foremost is the fact that our congregation is a very generous bunch of people. All the Committee has to do is ask (and occasionally remind) and our members enthusiastically respond. Secondly, we have a wonderful church community that people feel strongly connected to and want to support. We have a good product! Last but not least, people in the Church willingly volunteer to serve on the Stewardship Committee, and Judi Fuller does all the administrative and bookkeeping work!

¹The Spending Policy for St. Thomas Endowment Fund authorizes an annual distribution of monies from the Fund equal three percent (3.0%) of the most-recent three-year moving average of the market value of the Fund as calculated as of December 31 each year. Monies so determined (the "Annual Distribution") may be transferred, in whole or in part, to the Operating Account(s) of St. Thomas Church for any purpose as approved by the Vestry. From time-to-time, the Vestry may determine that any or all of the Annual Distribution is not required for operating purposes and, therefore, is not to be transferred to the Operating Account(s) (the "Non-Transferred Annual Distribution"). Any such Non-Transferred Annual Distribution shall be reinvested in the Fund.

² The Anonymous Grant (Line 4527) is a gift we receive each summer in the amount of \$40,000-50,000. This annual donation is part of a twenty-year, one million dollar gift begun in 2009. There are no restrictions on the use of this money, although the vestry prefers to place it in long-term funds when possible. 2019 will be the 11th year of this grant.

Columbarium by Sally Horn

The committee, comprised of Beverly Boas, Sally Horn, Heather Black, Gretchen Boe, and Father Ken, administers the maintenance and use of the Columbarium and recommends policy to the vestry. Our committee meets twice a year, in June and October. Members serve a three year term. Retiring from the committee this year was Carol Karner who has served as secretary during her three year term.

As of December 31, 2018, the balance in the Columbarium Fund was \$18,498.01. An additional unit of 64 niches was ordered and has been installed. 68 niches are now available for \$1,000 each and 9 niches for larger urns may be purchased for \$2,000. 11 names plates for the Memorial Board are currently available for \$300 each. When the name plates are filled, the committee will install an additional Memorial Board which as already been purchased. Once a Columbarium space has been reserved and purchased, there is no additional expense or annual maintenance fees.

The date for this years "Hole in the Wall" celebration of life party for those who currently have purchased niches or nameplates, will be hosted by Heather Black on July 29, 2019 at 6 p.m.

Please visit the columbarium which currently is being maintained beautifully and seasonally by Beverly Boas. All members of the Committee are available to review the process for reservations or to answer any questions.

Adult Education Committee by Don Liebich, Chair

The 2018 Adult Education program began with a number of sessions coordinated with the Sun Valley Center for the Arts Big Idea Project entitled "This Land is Whose Land" which focused on immigration and refugees. As part of this series we had a forum conversation with the Wood River Jewish Community on the "Diary of Anne Frank." Asmaa Albukaie, a Syrian American woman, shared her travel journey to the United States, reflected on life in Syria, and described her experiences living in Idaho. St. Thomas Forum had a two-part series entitled "Give Me Your Tired and Poor" in which we examined U.S. immigration policy: current status, policy choices and ethical issues. We also had a session in which we discussed what we learned from considering the theme of "This Land is Whose Land" and how we are called to act in response.

Other programs included three sessions on the experience of pilgrimage. Rev. Bill Harper led a session on Travel: Pilgrim or Tourist; Brenda Powell discussed her pilgrimage on the Camino de Santiago and Devra Mary discussed her pilgrimage to Kumano Codo in Japan. During the summer, we were fortunate to have Irwin Sentilles return to lead a series of lectures on "First Century Views of Jesus." We also had a class on "Was America Founded as a Christian Nation?"

We are looking forward to another series of interesting, thought provoking and spiritually enhancing programs. Jima Rice and Don Liebich have been coordinating this ministry. If you are interested in participating or have suggestions for future topics, please contact either one.

We got to see the new kitchen and dining room, which St. Thomas parishioners help to fund, that now allows for the safe preparation and serving. The Vocational Training Center is up and running with a new administrator, giving needed skills to the up and coming adults who have aged out of the school. Many of the original children we began sponsoring in 2010 are now adults!
- * Our team worked to collect toothbrushes, toothpaste, floss, mouthwash, and chapstick donated from local dentists in Ketchum and Hailey. Along with what Father Joseph brought from his church we passed out over 600 of these to the children of Mirebalais
- In April of 2018, Doug and Dydy Cleven and Art Dahl went to Mirebalais to see what all our donations help with. We saw the SAES home where 29 children are cared for by staff. Music Ministry by Joel Bejot

Organist:

In 2018, I played for 77 Eucharistic services (including weddings and funerals), and 29 other services. I practice regularly, and attempt to balance supporting congregational singing with creative hymn accompaniments, as well as to offer one recital per year, which I gave on November 4.

Music Director:

Choirs:

Parish Choir:

RSCM Choirs:

Evensong Choir:

We offer evensong on the 3rd or 4th Sunday of the month at 5:30 April – December. Our little choir worked on a lot of great music. Four different priests and laypeople officiated at the services on a rotating basis.

Other Services:

Sacred Space:

In January, we resumed a new service entitled "Sacred Space" led by a few singers and myself. The service was characterized by Bible readings, poetry, lectio divina group homilies, and less formal music.

Taizé:

Last year, a few singers and myself helped lead each Taizé service, which added a lovely layer to the music. In December, the service resumed with some returning singers.

There's More!

Handbell Choir:

We still have a set of Malmark Handbells borrowed from St. Michael's Cathedral in Boise. We have 7 ringers that meet on a regular basis, and they ring in church about once a month.

Concert Series:

I produced "Wintereisse" in February, my own organ recital in November, and had two screenings of "Sacred Sound."

Thomas Playhouse:

I supported a couple of the numbers at the Girlfriend Lunch. For Company B, I was the Music Director, and, for the fall show, I played and adapted the synth part with the small orchestra.

Other:

In February, we produced a talent show for Shrove Tuesday.

In June, I attended the RSCM Training Camp in Portland, OR. An amazing experience.

In August, I worked with Rabbi Robbi and Fr. Ken on writing a new song with our congregations.

In November, I taught a hymn workshop.

Thank you all very much for the opportunity to live and work here. It has been a wonderful year, and I thank you for all your support for my family and me.

Pastoral Care Team by Maryanne Whitcomb

The Pastoral Care Team continued its traditional role in 2018 of offering support and comfort for those in need within the St. Thomas family. Under the direct leadership and guidance of Father Ken, the Team members meet on the fourth Tuesday of every month. Members currently are: Jeanne Cassell, Connie Hoffman, Pat Jorgensen, Marcia Liebich, Marylyn Pauley, Patty Sloan, and Maryanne Whitcomb. The various needs of the parish are brought to the teams' attention either when a St. Thomas member directly requests care in some fashion, or when Father Ken is made aware of a need.

Members' needs can vary greatly, but might include an illness or hospitalization, grieving a loss, challenges of aging, or facing some distress in their own lives or those of a family member. The types of care range from phone calls, notes or cards of encouragement, performing helpful simple errands, preparing and delivering occasional meals, or brief home visits to comfort. However, the primary action of the Pastoral Care Team is that of prayer, and the maintenance of the parish prayer list. One member of the Team volunteers to pray the parish prayer list, in its entirety, each of the seven days of each week. The team also conducts a quarterly phone call review of the list – to assure that it is up to date and accurate.

Anyone wishing to add themselves, or a friend or family member, to the prayer list may do so at any time in the year by filling out a brief Prayer Request Form that can be obtained from Judi Fuller in the church office. Further, anyone interested in exploring whether their own spiritual gifts might lend themselves well to serving on the Pastoral Care Team is encouraged to speak further with Father Ken.

Stephen Ministry by Maryanne Whitcomb

MISSION: To train and supervise lay caregivers to provide Christian care to those hurting, troubled or in need of other kinds

VISION: We serve as Christ to one another by offering quality on-going weekly care to members of St. Thomas Church, and potentially, others in need in our community.

BACKGROUND: in January of 2017, Father Ken, accompanied by Marcia Liebich, Helen Morgus, and Maryanne Whitcomb, attended a week of Stephen Minister Leadership training in Anaheim, California. They returned equipped to teach the 50 hours of training required to become a Stephen Minister. Attending that first class in late 2017 were Don Liebich, Sabrina Roblin, Georgia Stewart, and Rebecca Waycott. All four, plus Marcia Liebich and Maryanne Whitcomb, were commissioned to serve as Stephen Ministers at a special ceremony at St. Thomas in April of 2018.


All six, since then, have been carefully and confidentially matched, by Father Ken, with a care receiver. The six continue to give care and are meeting twice a month with the other Stephen Leaders to offer progress reports, to receive supportive supervision, and to participate together in continuing education.

LOOKING FORWARD: The Stephen Leader team has begun training a second group of Stephen Ministers this Fall.

Meeting every Monday to receive the 50 hours of training, under the leadership of Helen Morgus and assisted by the other Stephen Leaders, are: Art Dahl, Margie Gould, Wayne Hedberg Schmidt, and Alyson Witmer. A commissioning is planned for April 7, 2019, after which Art, Margie and Alyson will be matched by Father Ken with care receivers within St. Thomas, and Wayne will carry the training into the work that comes forth in his future ministry.

LONG TERM: It is hoped that a class of Stephen Ministers will be trained at St. Thomas annually, and that others will be able to attend Regional Leadership Training to assist in future trainings, peer supervision, and continuing education. Those interested in learning more are encouraged to speak with Father Ken, or one of the other Stephen Leaders.

Taizé by Georgia Stewart



The weekly Taize services held at St. Thomas during the winter months began in Advent of 2017, and continued in 2018 until the beginning of Lent. These beautiful candlelight services of song, silence, and prayer were conducted on Wednesdays at 5:30 p.m. in the nave. Once again, there was larger attendance than the previous year and increased participation from the interfaith community of the Valley.

The contemplative prayer form that has become known as "Taize Prayer" takes its name from the Taize community of France—an ecumenical Christian monastic fraternity in Burgundy-founded in the early 1940's by Brother Roger. For more than 60 years, until his death in 2005, Brother Roger worked tirelessly to open ways to heal the divisions between Christians and among people in general. The Taize community is made up of more than 100 brothers from Catholic, Protestant, and Orthodox backgrounds who come from about 30 countries. It has become one of the world's most important sites of Christian pilgrimage, with a focus on youth. Every year thousands of young adults from every continent go to Taize for prayer, Bible study, sharing, and communal work. They are encouraged to live in the spirit of kindness, simplicity, and reconciliation.

The St. Thomas service is crafted around the worship style of Taize, it includes music from the Taize community as well as other music in the style of Taize. It incorporates two distinguishing marks of Taize-like worship: repetition and silence.

Youth & Family Ministries by Sara Gorby

"Equipping young people for lives of value, faith, and meaning."

Youth Group is a place for our young people to gather and talk about life, school, family, friends, and faith. It has been an honor to sit with the young people of St. Thomas and get to know them better. We had a large group of 6th graders move into Youth Group. This has increased our regular morning attendance significantly. Average Sunday went from 3-4 to 6-8, with some Sundays still coming in at 4 young people.

Youth Group curriculum is based on themes that are selected by mentors and informed by what our young people want to explore. We began the year talking about Baptism and used a slide show to talk about the symbols of baptism. Then we dove into our baptism promises with the theme "Respect the Dignity of Every Human Being", which included talking about the Rev. Martin Luther King Jr.'s ministry and civil rights leadership. Through Lent we discussed Faith: A Practice with topics of Self-Care, Meditation, Prayer, Mental Health. All of these themes were rich with scripture reading and conversation. A highlight was having Sara Pettit teach us to make her no bake "bolitas," protein balls that were so good! During the Easter Season we told our spiritual stories and where we feel God in our experiences at St. Thomas.

The summer is always filled with St. Thomas Playhouse opportunities and young people join "Grand Days of Summer" as helpers and participants.

In the fall, we spent our first few weeks getting to know each other, comparing our getting to know each other to Jesus gathering disciples. We used games and food to share this time together. Other themes included: Community Series, looking at how Jesus built his community and how it compares to how we build community today, THANK FULL, series on gratitude and serving others, finishing 2018 with a series called MARVELOUS LIGHT. MARVELOUS LIGHT was a highlight with our young people retelling the story of Jesus from the annunciation to his teaching in the temple.

Teen Confirmation Class was held February-May with five young people being confirmed, Saba Grossman, Nicole Kanowsky, Logan Lindstrom, Bella Maurtua, and Julia Ott.

Children's Ministry by Liz Hickey and Sara Gorby

Rachel Brannon served our children in the role of Sunday School Interim Coordinator as we explored next steps in hiring a part-time Children's Ministry Coordinator. We are so grateful to Rachel for her faithful service. She has helped maintain and build relationships with children and their families. We also thank Helen Morgus for her leadership with Godly Play and assisting Rachel during the year.

Sunday School Highlights:

- In January, we held a Godly Play Story Drive to bring new materials into the classroom. Stories included Old Testament Stories, More Stories of Jesus, and The Saints. It was a huge success and we have been able to incorporate new stories through out the year.
- Attendance remained steady at 5-8 in each of the Sunday School Classes offered (Godly Play, Building Faith Brick by Brick, and Weaving God's Promises). We averaged about one combination class per month. Rachel and Sara made the decision early in the year to work toward a two class Sunday School to help with teacher and space allocation in the Fall.
- UP FRONT (Kids Up Front) children were invited to sit in the front pew with families. Father Ken and Helen Morgus geared sermons to a broader audience to include the children with great success! UP FRONT Sundays were also well attended by children with an average of 15 children, plus parents or grandparents.

October 1st, I was fortunate enough to join the St. Thomas family as the Children's Ministry Coordinator. I knew I had big shoes to fill but I have enjoyed this challenge and loved all the support I have had along the way. The Children here bring me such joy and I love getting the opportunity to grow with them.

We started our fall season with a bang. The Blessing of the Animals always proves to be a big day for St. Thomas and its animals. The Sunday Schoolers got a kick out of making bacon cheddar dog biscuits and cat nip treats. We had many hands to make and serve these treats for our four (sometimes 3) legged friends.

We had a great attendance for the Fall Potluck at the Loving's Home. Courtney's famous brisket, hospitality and fierce kickball game was a great start to the fall season. Thank you to the Loving's for hosting our Fall Children and Youth Ministries Potluck. It was one we won't forget!

We have now divided our Sunday School into 2 classes, Pre-K through 2nd grade called Godly Play and grades 3rd through 5th grade called Godly Play B3 (Short for Brick By Brick). Our attendance is averaging 5-8 students in the Godly Play class and 4-6 students in the B3 class.

Over the past few months the children have studied many different stories from the Bible and some more close to home. During each class, they had an opportunity to discuss what it meant to them and how that might reflect in their own lives. Some of the highlights have been Joseph, the Columbarium, and the Nativity. For Joseph and the story of his brothers, the children made Joseph and his coat of many colors. During All Saints, we discussed the final resting place and the importance of remembering our loved ones. The children toured the St. Thomas Columbarium and then made a Day of the Dead altar in the classroom with things that reminded them of the ones that they have lost, followed by a roundtable discussion on who they lost and why they were so memorable.

In December, we studied Advent and the Holy Family. Per the children's request, we made an edible gingerbread nativity. Their discussion on making room for this miracle baby and what it means to be kind was truly moving. It set the pace for the Holiday Season!

I want to thank all the Sunday school teachers and leaders that have given their time and energy this year: Dydy Cleven, Art Dahl, Helen Morgus, Courtney Loving, Rachel Webster, Rachel Brannon, and Sara Gorby. Also including the Doorperson's and assistants who show up to set the pace for the day: Pam Irby, Lisa Leach, Ragna Caron, Lou Morris, Alyson Witmer, Sabrina Roblin, and Jill Hitchins. A special thanks to our resident craft aficionado Ashley Musbach. She is the creative mind behind some the children's favorite crafts like the wooden Jacob's Ladders and the beautiful heart angels.

St. Thomas Playhouse by Brett Moellenberg

St. Thomas Playhouse had incredible artistic and commercial success in 2018. Our Summer Theater Project and Family Main Stage productions saw sizable increases in ticket sales, while our Company B 2 (August) day camp enjoyed record tuition income. These examples of growth continue to propel Playhouse forward and allow us to create more ambitious productions with each passing year.

We also had some significant changes to our Playhouse Charter Committee in 2018 with longtime members Rebecca Waycott, Heather Black and Susan Bilkey stepping off for at least one cycle. Page Klune is the new Chair of the committee with Deb Roberston as Vice Chair.

Playhouse saw a significant decrease in tuition for Company B (June) camp, as well as a decrease in donors for 2018. We plan to pursue more underwriting for our programs and explore more grant opportunities locally, nationally and within the Episcopal Church. We also plan to increase the marketing of our programs to parents of Pre-K to 1st grade children, as well as bilingual families.

St. Thomas Playhouse continues to be the only consistent home for American Musical Theater in the Wood River Valley. We are proud to be able to present so many wonderful pieces to the community. Please enjoy a few photos from our 2018 season.

Diocesan Convention by Helen Morgus

The 51st Convention of the Episcopal Diocese of Idaho was held over the weekend of November 9th - 11th in Boise. At Convention, lay and clergy delegates hear reports, approve the budget, and elect leaders for Diocesan Council and Standing Committee. And amidst and beyond that, we connect, we learn, we serve, and we worship.

Representing St. Thomas this year were Father Ken and Isaac Brannon, Art Dahl, Judi Fuller, Brad and Ashley Musbach, Helen and Wally Morgus and Deacon Wayne Hedberg Schmidt. Carter Hedberg Schmidt went as a guest, as all are invited to do, any year.

Diocesan Convention is a unique chance to cross into new territory and meet our brothers and sisters from around Idaho. This year, we were seated in mixed groups for guided discussions about two issues: what the consequences should be for parishes that are behind on their financial support of the Diocese (their diocesan assessment), and what we envision for the future of Paradise Point, the Diocese's summer camp on Payette Lake, where a conservation easement is being considered. The discussion questions brought forth strong and diverse responses. Reporters from each table summarized and shared them for all to hear, and Diocesan Council received written feedback that will inform decisions going forward.

Convention also provides a new perspective on the institution of the wider church. This year's Guest Presenter was The Rev. Canon Stephanie Spellers, a Canon to the Presiding Bishop for Evangelism. Canon Spellers instructed, questioned, cajoled and inspired. Her joyful talks were sprinkled with movement and song: we stood to sing spirituals and mingle with one another. And the point was, you and I are Episcopal evangelists when we seek, name and

celebrate Jesus' loving presence, and then invite people to more. This is what it means to be the Church in this moment—to follow Jesus and his Way of Love. It's front and center on the website of The Episcopal Church (https://www.episcopalchurch.org/).

We also hear the good news of mission on the local level, made possible by Idaho Episcopal Foundation grants. Examples: new Prayer Books for inmates at the Snake River Correctional Institute; materials for a story quilt made by refugees at Artisans4Hope in Boise; supplies for the Free Little Pantry associated with a soup kitchen in Idaho Falls. Any parish may sponsor a local organization in need for IEF funds, extending the love of God beyond the church's walls. Who in the Wood River Valley could benefit from an I.E.F. grant sponsored by St. Thomas Church?

Each year, Convention also involves a service project. Folks in the Western Deanery learned that schools needed toiletries for families that can't afford them. So parishes collected hygiene products and volunteers brought them to Convention. Thanks to Art and Bobbie Dahl for heading this up at St. Thomas. At Convention, teen volunteers sorted the donations and filled 28 boxes that school nurses in western Idaho will distribute to children and families in need.

And Convention draws us together to thank, praise and dwell with God. Worship binds and realigns us. As host, the Southwestern Deanery worship committee wove prayers and music from traditional and refreshing sources into liturgies for Compline on Friday; Morning, Noonday and Evening Prayer on Saturday and Eucharist on Sunday.

At Diocesan Convention, we conduct the business of the Diocese, but as 2018 and other years prove, it is far more than "business as usual." It is mutual blessing.


